And see it we did along with its sibling, #6094! Not only did we see them, but we could get close enough to almost smell them! So you see, we definitely made a 'Journey to Nikon's Birthplace', and we saw the very beginnings of the entire Nikon family. We saw firsthand #6091 and #6094. A very great privilege and appreciated by all.

I have plans to follow up on this event with some 'fallout' or sorts. In future issues of the Journal will be more photos of #6091 and #6094, of a quality we have not had access to before. "JOURNEY TO NIKON'S BIRTHPLACE"

NHS-CON9....TOKYO 2004! THE LAND OF NIKONS!

The theme for NHS-Con9 proved appropriate on three levels: Tokyo has always been the headquarters of Nippon Kogaku & the 'hometown' of our Nikons; we were able to visit the Ohi factory & see the very buildings where the entire rangefinder

system & most of the early reflex system was designed & built; & finally, we were allowed to view at tabletop level the very first Nikon Prototype known affectionately as "Mother One", as well as the 4th Nikon ever made! Now that is what I call a "Journey to Nikon's Birthplace"! For those of you who were there the experience is etched in your minds forever, & the images and words within these pages will serve to reinforce those memories. But for those of you who could not attend my task is to try to recreate four days in Tokyo that proved to be one of the most exciting & best-organized Conventions we have ever had. So with some words, & as many photos as I can squeeze between these covers, here is a guided tour of NHS-Con9, a true "Journey to Nikon's Birthplace".

Things actually started on Saturday morning in my room! That's when Yuki Kawai, Akihiko Suzuki, Hayao Tanabe, Michio Akiyama, Bill

Kraus & Uli Koch arrived at my door. We had work to do! All the presentations set for Monday had been done as 'Powerpoint' presentations consisting of CDs from Germany, Ireland, the US & Japan. First job was to make sure everything worked! So we spent time running through the presentations on the computer & the digital projector. Of course various Nikons materialized and once we were sure the 'high tech' stuff would work, we talked cameras. Yuki served as the coordinator between myself & Suzuki-san, sending and translating countless emails between the US & Japan (with much help from Setsuko Martin!). Akihiko was the main man in Tokyo, making the arrangements & lining up what proved to be a very impressive list of events. Tanabe-san would be running the projector & computer on Monday (along with Yuki), & Akiyama-san, Bill & Uli were slated as speakers for the meeting. Things worked fine & after a coffee with Masao Furushou, Nikon collector & manager of the Akasaka Prince hotel, Bill & I took off for the Ginza to meet up with some members from Europe (Peter Lownds, Tony & Oisin Hurst, Jaap & Eric Korten, Ernst Thiel, & Jan Bos) to see some

camera stores. And that we did, for the next 5 or 6 hours! There are a lot of camera stores in Tokyo to see!

On Sunday morning I was privileged to be invited to the home of Tatsuhiko Arakawa, familiar to all readers of this Jour-


nal for his writings on the early history of Nikon. The meeting was arranged by Akito Tamla (Tamura), a long time member of the Society. I was very grateful for this opportunity since Arakawa-san spoke to us at NHS-Con5 in Tokyo in 1996 & has been a friend of the Society for years. He is also 82 years old & I do not know when I will return to Japan, & I felt that seeing him was important. He allowed us to view some really fascinating documents that I hope will be available to us in the future. Thank you Tamla-san for making it happen.

Sunday evening was registration in the hotel lobby & all but one member was there (Jimmy Koh made it the next morning ..plane problems), so everyone from around the globe who was expected arrived on time. The final tally was 45 members from the West representing the US, Canada, Australia, & 9 European countries, plus our Japanese hosts.

Monday was the big day, and all those staying at the Akasaka Prince were in the lobby by 8:15am ready for the short walk or taxi ride to the JCII Headquarters & Museum. By 9am all had arrived at JCII, & things were being set up & tested (computers, projectors, microphones, video cameras, etc) as well as a second room for refreshments. By 9:30 we were ready to roll!

Uli Koch, author of the Nikon F Trilogy, led off with a talk on the German market 'Nikkor" F & its literature. Hans Braakhuis then followed with an introduction to a paper he recently completed on the history of the Dutch connection with the Japanese optical industry highlighting Nikon's history from 1917 to 1949 when they entered the camera business. We then had a one-hour presentation by
Mr. Kenji Toyoda, a former Nikon employee
whom I had met in 1996. Toyoda-san was the main
organizer & researcher for the special exhibit on the
Nikon prototypes that we would see after lunch in the
JCII Museum! So we were given an advance slide show of
some of the more interesting items that would be on display as



well as his words describing certain aspects of each prototype. This proved to be an excellent introduction to the exhibit.

We then broke for a short lunch that was brought in (would



you believe Subway, and it really was good!) & had over an hour to go downstairs to see the exhibit. The Museum is closed on Mondays, but was opened just for us so we had the run of the

place with no crowds save ourselves! And pictures were allowed! Another favor given us. I cannot begin to describe all that was on

display but it did include all the rangefinder prototypes (6091, 6094, Nikon L, SP2, SPX, etc) as well as production items, reflex prototypes & rarities, NASA equipment, underwater gear of all

types, & even a display of early Canons sporting Nikkor optics.

Following the Museum was the really special event of the day brought to us by Mikio Itoh, Chief Archivist for Nikon. Itohsan brought into the room both 6091 & 6094!! He had removed them from the Museum exhibit & we were allowed to see them on a tabletop. No touching (Itoh-san and his assistant, Hirotaka Toba, both wore white gloves when handling them!), but photos were allowed as both cameras were left on the table for quite some time, allowing everyone the chance to get within inches of 'Mother One' and the 4th prototype! Tony Hurst and I were then allowed to make a series of photos of both cameras for future use



here in the Journal.

Needless to say, it took a while for things, such as heart rates, to return to normal, but we had another marvelous Tony



Hurst slide show. Tony also made a poster for the convention which is on our rear cover this issue. Then came Michio Akiyama, the leading collector of 'industrial Nikkors' of all types. Akiyamasan kept us spellbound as he presented some of the strangest & most exotic Nikkors imaginable. We think of only the photo-

graphic optics, but Nikon has been a major producer of all types of specialty items for decades. These pieces were always extremely expensive & unique & Akiyama-san knows them all! He presented his treasures with humor & kept us all entertained. See his many examples on his web site at http://


Next up was Tony Hilton who flew in from Australia to give us a talk on the Bronica-Nikkors, which have been shown here in the Journal over the years. These are rather rare optics today & Tony has them all. We all learned some new things from him including the probability that the 1000mm/f6.3 Reflex- Nikkor exists in Bronica mount in only '2 pieces'!

Bill Kraus and I then did a short talk on the early dealer literature produced by Nikon as well as the importers such as Overseas Finance & Trading & Ehrenreich. Using a Powerpoint slide show we illustrated over 100 pieces of literature dating back to 1950.

Finally, Nobuji Hatsushiba closed the meeting with what turned to be a real winner. Nob, as he is affectionately known,

wowed us with slides of all types of Nikon filters and caps. Now you might say, 'how exciting can these be?'. Well, everyone stopped & watched & the comments ran like this...Wow! Did you see that? I never knew they made that! I have never seen one of those! Where did he get all this stuff! So you see, even the small items can really grab the attention of a collector, especially when well presented with some humor!

We then broke for refreshments (pizza, snacks, beer, pop and 'other' liquids) that were arranged by Suzuki-san right there in the next room. A fitting end to a great day.

But things were not over yet. A chartered bus picked us up at the hotel Tuesday at

7:30am to take us to the Shinagawa section of Tokyo & the original Ohi factory. We then walked down 'Nikon Street' to a new office building to meet with Mr. Shigeo Ono, former President




& Chairman of Nikon & now Counselor. Besides Mr. Ono, there were present Mr. Yoshiyuki Nakano who arranged the Nikon meeting as he did in 1996; Itoh-san; Toba-san; and Hidehiko Tanaka, Manager of the Sales Promotion Dept of Nikon. We then met Mr. Ono who participated in a question & answer session. On display was a case with a completely disassembled Nikon SP & the original prototype for the 50mm/f1.4 Nikkor for the Nikon F! We were then led up to the roof! It was a clear crisp day & we found ourselves looking out on the very factory buildings where everything from the Nikon One through the F2 were designed & built. The same buildings within which Fuketa-san & his team had worked their miracles that saved Nikon from oblivion over 50 years ago. We took photos & were told that even the employees were not allowed up here. It was a nice touch.

We then boarded our bus for a ride to the Asakusa section of Tokyo for a prearranged lunch at a tempura restaurant (both the bus & lunch, as well as the food on Monday, were all included in the convention fee), after which we were now free to roam to our hearts' content. Many stayed in the area till past 6pm visiting stores and shops & shooting photos at the Kaminarimon Gate & Pagoda Shrine near the restaurant. But more was to come!

As in 1996, we timed the convention around the Matsuya Old Camera Show, the largest collectors' show in Japan! It be-







gan at 10am Wednesday morning & many of us were at the front of the line! Your editor was in the 2nd elevator up! You have to see Matsuya to really appreciate it but I have included photos here. Not only is it huge but everything is in sparkling glass cases beautifully displayed with individual price cards. It is a large well-lighted room on the same floor as all the restaurants so you don't need to leave the building. My guess is that there was about 10-15 million dollars worth of cameras on display (does anyone know?), so there was something for everyone. As for Nikons....there were Nikon Ones (2), Ms (dozens), an S3M, black bodies, both real and imagined (at least 20) and countless lenses and accessories. A collector's paradise. Matsuya runs for three days, so many returned again (I went back on Thursday). If you hadn't seen enough Nikons on Monday and Tuesday, you surely got your fill on Wednesday.

The visit to Matsuya was done on an individual basis so members could plan their day however they pleased. But, there was still one planned event remaining that had been arranged by the committee; the closing formal banquet on Wednesday night.

It was held at the special banquet building annex at the Akasaka Prince hotel. We were shown to the Sapphia Room on

the 2nd floor of a very interesting English Tudorstyle building. And what a room it was! Very elegant! I really was not completely aware of what we would receive that evening but I, as well as all who attended, were pleasantly surprised by what we saw. Not only a very nice banquet room, but along one entire wall a buffet consisting of Japanese, Chinese, French and western cuisine as well as desserts & a separate Sushi



bar! In addition, an open bar with all types of drinks was available the entire evening. But there was more. Member Tad Sato had provided 720ml bottles of Sake beginning with registration on Sunday. Each attendee was given a bottle with his/her packet that night (you should have seen the looks I got on Saturday when the hotel desk called to tell me I had 18 cases of Sake waiting for me in the lobby!) 18 cases! From JCII we had Ms. Mayumi Kobayashi, Mr. Yokota, Mr. Yano (Director) & Mrs. Moriyama, who was our special guest. Mrs. Moriyama's husband had been one of the founders of the JCII & its museum & she herself is a former director & still actively involved with JCII. In addition she is the former Minister of Justice for the Japanese government & currently a member of the House of Representatives in the Diet! She gave us a fine opening speech & I thank her for fitting us into her very busy schedule.


So the room was full, the food & drink were plentiful, Nikons were everywhere, & the people were just great! Everyone had a wonderful time & many of the western members came up to me











PREVIEW

You saw it here first! The lens pictured here represents 50% of the production (at the moment). It is a prototype Heliar 50/3.5 in a rigid Nikon S-mount. Mr. Kobayashi produced a small series of Bessa T101s in 2001 with this lens in screw mount. Those of us lucky enough to get hold of these cameras soon found out that

the lens is extremely good. One well-known lens tester claimed that it is the best 50mm lens he has ever used! Of course, everybody tried to buy the lens alone, but it was only available in the T101 package. Last year Mr. Kobayashi and I talked about the fact that there are still lots of users who want the lens. He does not want to make a lens only. He feels that the buyers who paid a premium for their T101 and the Heliar should retain the exclusivity of this package. On the other hand, a small run in a different mount and a slight redesign of the external mount would not affect this. Thus, here is a prototype of the Heliar 50/3.5 in S-mount. It follows the classic Heliar design with 5 elements (front & rear cemented pairs). The plan is to produce a small series of 300 R2S cameras with this lens. Not a big run and the price yet to be determined.

I have been using my Bessa T101 with the Heliar since 2001 and it is a great lens. There is a quality to the Heliar design that makes it stand out. It is not only very sharp with a nice smooth contrast, but it has a "roundness" to the image that no other modern lens that I have tried has shown. Is the S-mount Heliar just as good? Judging from the negatives it is just as smooth and sharp as the T101 lens. The rigid mount is an advantage as I have found that most collapsible lenses tend to get a bit loose with extensive use. Of course, it would not hurt that this lens will be scarce too. You can buy collapsible 50/2 Summars in Leica screwmount for \$30-50, but the rigid Summar is at least 30-40 times that price!

I will do some more pictures with the Heliar for the next issue (matched up with the 28/3.5 and 85/3.5 S-mount lenses). Summer is coming and the great floodlight in the sky is now giving us reasonable exposures, even with 25 and 50ASA film.

'RETRO HOODS' FOR NIKON RF



Those of you who purchased Tom's magnificent remake of the famous shade for the 50mm/f1.1 Nikkor know the superb job he did. The f1.1 shade in metal was, and still is, a perfect example of engineering overkill. And though today's manufacturing techniques have come a long way, the f1.1 shade remake was still a formidable task. With the success of that project Tom thought that there would be interest in updated versions of some other rangefinder era shades & settled on the late style black shades for the 35mm/f1.8 and f2.5 Nikkors. Of course the one for the f2.5 will work perfectly on the late versions of the 35mm/f3.5 Nikkor as well. He has done Nikon one better again in that he has made these new shades in a straight screw-in style, not the snap-on reversing type that sounds good on paper but is not always practical. From my point of view, the reversing snap-on shades can be too easily detached when bumped. Not a problem with the screw-in method. But what about storage you ask. Well, none of the camera cases would accommodate the reversed shade nor do any of the lens cases. So the feature is not that important in reality. Tom chose the wide angles for a good reason. Over time shades for the teles have survived quite well because each lens was supplied with one. Not so the wides. Their shades were optional & not often purchased, so today they are very hard to find & very expensive as well. So now you have an alternative. These new shades are beautifully produced & are extremely useful. You can obtain them directly from Tom. The price is \$125 for 1, or \$315 for 3. A bargain in today's marketplace. I have a set & I can highly recommend them. RJR
